## Meeting of the 5th Strategic Plan (SP5) Working Group

Monday 11 December 2023, 13.00 – 15:15 CET (by videoconference)

## Minutes

- The Co-Chair, Luiz Eduardo Andrade de Souza, the National Focal Point for Brazil, opened the
  meeting, welcomed participants and introduced the agenda. The Co-Chair noted that Co-Chair
  Jacey Scott of Canada has been reassigned and that Elena Sanchez McAuley has been designated as
  the temporary National Focal Point for Canada and will serve as a Co-Chair of the Strategic Plan
  Working Group. Ms. Sanchez McAuley then introduced herself.
- 2. The Consultant (Rob McInnes) was invited to share an update on the engagement and consultation process. The Consultant provided an overview of the process since SC62. He then shared a presentation that provided an overview of the results from the online survey and regional virtual workshops. A copy of the presentation is attached to these notes. The Consultant brought attention to the variances in survey responses to what are perceived to be the negative drivers of wetland loss/degradation and what are possible solutions by region, sectors and socio-economic status.
- 3. The Consultant provided an overview of inputs received from the virtual consultations held with regional groups, sector representatives, academia, etc. noting the interest from participants that targets and indicators align with other reporting mechanisms particularly the Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF), that they be specific as possible and consideration given to indicators that can report on multiple drivers/solutions. He closed his presentation with an overview of the desk review process and the documents and reports being analyzed.
- 4. The Co-Chair introduced five questions where inputs from Working Group members would be useful in informing the development of targets and indicators for the new Strategic Plan.
  - 1. Do all SP5 targets (and therefore indicators) need to be universal for the Convention or should there be focussed regional targets (and indicators)?
  - 2. Should all targets carry the same weight, or could there be a prioritisation of targets?
  - 3. In the 4th Strategic Plan, the majority of targets (and indicators) are about 'processes' (i.e., establishing a National Wetland Committee, etc.) rather than 'outcomes' (i.e., state of wetlands has been improved). Should the emphasis in the 5th Strategic Plan seek to move away from 'process' indicators towards more 'outcome' indicators?
  - 4. How can we build upon and update the existing targets?
    - a. What are elements that countries feel are missing from the 4th Strategic Plan?

- b. How much new information should we include in the 5th Strategic Plan?
- 5. Through the 5th Strategic Plan, how can we enhance the Convention's synergies with other multilateral environmental agreements (e.g. the Convention on Biological Diversity) and other international institutions while respecting the mandate of the Convention on Wetlands?
- 5. Interventions on question #1 as to whether SP5 targets should be global or regional were made by Australia, Brazil, Costa Rica, China and the United Kingdom. It was noted that there are nuances and differences between regions, with overall agreement that targets (and therefore indicators) should be global within a flexible framework for regions. Other views shared included that global targets could be more simplified and evidence based. Some views suggested that the Ramsar Regional Initiatives could provide valuable space for identifying topics of regional relevance that would require further attention.
- 6. Interventions on question #2 on whether targets should be prioritized were made by China, Kenya, United Kingdom and the STRP Vice -Chair. There was an overarching view that prioritization in some form would benefit implementation and measurement noting that it was important for Parties to establish priorities based on their individual context and situation. Suggestions for prioritization included using a simpler structure for SP5 which would assist with prioritization as well as a framework that allowed for regions and Parties to prioritize. There was agreement that an ability to prioritize is needed at the national level and should not be done globally through a hierarchical approach. It was noted that attention needs to be given to ensuring that while targets could be prioritized, that data provided through reporting be globally consistent.
- 7. Interventions on question #3 on whether targets and indicators are focused on 'processes' or 'outcomes' were made by Brazil, China, Japan and Birdlife International. There was general agreement that targets and indicators that were more 'outcome' focused would be beneficial. It was noted that 'outcome' oriented targets and indicators are difficult to measure and could result in a reporting burden for Parties. Questions were raised including whether the current SP4 indicators are working and do we have confidence that processes are resulting in outcomes? The Consultant responded that the evidence is that the implementation of processes as found in SP4 has not resulted in positive outcomes for wetlands. A further comment was made on the importance of having alignment with relevant targets and indicators within the GBF.
- 8. Intervention on question #4 were made by Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, Costa Rica, United Kingdom and the STRP Vice-Chair. Members identified a number of elements that they felt should be in SP5 including social and economic challenges of wetland dependent communities (e.g. livelihoods), participation of Indigenous Peoples and local communities and their contributions to wetlands conservation, restoration and wise use, climate adaptation, means of implementation, including innovative financial mechanisms, interlinkages with the GBF, a focus on sustainable development and global environmental priorities of climate, biodiversity and pollution, and youth, women and other underrepresented groups. It was suggested that a GAP analysis of SP4 targets would be useful and that SP5 targets should be timebound and measurable.
- 9. Interventions on question #5 were made by Brazil, China, Eswatini and the STRP Vice-Chair. Members expressed the importance of alignment with GBF targets and indicators as well as those of other MEAs. The STRP Vice-Chair reported on STRP task 5.2 that is looking into how better alignment between GBF indicators and indicators in SP5 can be achieved and that this matter is to

- be discussed extensively at STRP 26 taking place the first week of February and will feed into the development of SP5 targets and indicators.
- 10. The Co-Chair thanked members for their participation in the meeting, noted agreed upon actions and next steps (see below) and thanked members for their active engagement and participation in the meeting.

## **Action Items**

- The Secretariat will include the Consultants presentation in the meeting report.
- The Consultant will prepare an updated timeline which will be circulated with the meeting report with members invited to comment by 10 January 2024.
- Members to provide any additional written comments to the results of the survey by 10 January 2024, building on the discussions during the 11 December SPWG meeting.
- The next meeting of the Strategic Plan Working Group to take place the week of 4 March.
