## Report on World Wetlands Day – 2007

The Environmental Protection & Conservation Organisation – EPCO, a national environmental NGO, with the support of the National Park and Conservation-Ministry of Ago-Industry and the National Ramsar Committee celebrated the WWD -07 on the:

2<sup>nd</sup> February 2007 with an Exhibition on Products and Services of wetlands at the Rivulet Terre Rouge Estuary Birds Sanctuary the unique Ramsar site of Mauritius.

All the speakers at the opening ceremony highlighted the importance of wetlands and the products and services offered by wetlands.

Mr Kheswar Beeharry Panray ,CEO- EPCO, pointed out, Mangrove plantation in Mauritius that was estimated at about 20KM2 in 80s has drastically decreased to half, this can be taken as an indication how fast our wetlands are decreasing. He also talked on the theme of the WWD07 – *Wetlands support fisheries keep them healthy*. And he pointed out that Mauritius includes 42 species of fish and some 3200 registered fishers are directly concerned. Some 20 kg of fish is consumed per head locally and Mauritius also exports some 140Million USD of fish products annually, caught from the 52000 Km2 of fishery grounds around the island.
