**Progress report on the implementation of the third Joint Work Plan (2002-
2006) of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Convention on
Wetlands (Ramsar, Iran, 1971)**

1. As indicated in DOC. SC30-15, paragraph 7, the CBD and Ramsar Secretariats have prepared a full mid-term appraisal of progress in implementation of the third CBD-Ramsar Joint Work Plan.
2. This has been provided as an Information Paper (UNEP/CBD/COP/7/Inf/27) to CBD's 7th meeting of the Conference of the Parties, which will take place in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, on 9-20 February 2004, and is attached to this note.

Progress report on the implementation of the third joint work plan (2002-2006) of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Convention on Wetlands of International Importance especially as Waterfowl Habitat (Ramsar, Iran, 1971)

Note by the Executive Secretary

1. The Executive Secretary is circulating herewith, for the information of participants at the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, a report on the progress on implementation of the third joint work plan of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands. The report supplements the information contained in the note by the Executive Secretary on cooperation with other international conventions and organizations (UNEP/CBD/COP/7/19).
2. This progress report has been prepared in collaboration with the Secretariat of the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands.
3. Section I gives the background to the joint work plan. Section II details of the mechanisms for implementation. Section III reviews the time frame for implementation and reporting and section IV provides a detailed summary of the progress for each separate activity in the joint work plan.

I. BACKGROUND

4. The first two joint work plans of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Convention on Wetlands (Ramsar, Iran, 1971) covered the two two-year periods 1998-1999 and 2000-2001. At its fifth meeting, in May 2000, the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, in its decision V/21, commended the 2000-2001 joint work plan as a useful example of future cooperation between the Convention on Biological Diversity and other conventions. A progress report on the implementation of that work plan was presented to the Conference of the Parties at its sixth meeting as an information document (UNEP/CBD/COP/6/INF/12).

5. At its sixth meeting in March 2001 the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical, and Technological Advice (SBSTTA) requested the Executive Secretary to prepare a draft third joint work plan for consideration by the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity. At its twenty-sixth meeting in December 2001, Ramsar's Standing Committee ^{1/} noted the report on the second joint work plan and the elements of work proposed for the third joint work plan and agreed that both would be circulated to members of the Standing Committee for approval in early 2002, prior to the sixth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity. The Secretariat and the Ramsar Convention Bureau prepared the third joint work programme (2002-2006) (UNEP/CBD/COP/6/INF/14).

6. In its decision VI/20, adopted in April 2002, the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity welcomed and endorsed the third joint work plan. This decision noted with pleasure by the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Wetlands, in paragraph 5 of its resolution VIII.5, adopted at its eighth meeting, in November 2002.

7. The joint work plan commits the Executive Secretary to submit an interim report on its implementation to the seventh meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, including an ongoing review of the third joint work plan taking into account new elements arising from the work of the eighth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Ramsar Convention and also the eighth and ninth meetings of SBSTTA.

8. The joint work plan does not add new or additional elements to the work programme for either Convention. Rather it identifies those issues and areas of activity where common interests apply, and develops collaborative approaches designed to lead to more effective and consistent implementation.

9. The Secretariat as well as the SBSTTA Bureau participated in the eleventh meeting of the Scientific and Technical Review Panel (STRP) of the Ramsar Convention, which was held from 8 to 11 April 2003 in Gland, Switzerland. Subsequently, relevant Secretariat staff members have been assigned to serve on a number of STRP Working Groups that have been convened in the inter-sessional period to the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Ramsar Convention.

10. The Ramsar Secretariat ^{2/} and representatives of STRP participated in the eighth and ninth meetings of SBSTTA, and in a number of expert processes of the Convention, including ad hoc technical expert groups, liaison groups and expert working groups.

11. A significant area of collaborative work between the Secretariats during this reporting period has been in the review and elaboration of the programme of work of the Convention on Biological Diversity on inland water biological diversity. The Ramsar Secretariat, with the support of Wetlands International facilitated this work, with funding from the Government of the Netherlands, including through a liaison group meeting in 2002.

II. MECHANISMS FOR IMPLEMENTATION

12. The joint work plan is implemented mainly through institutional links between the two conventions, developed under the 1996 memorandum of cooperation between the two Secretariats.

13. The two secretariats, in their role of coordinating implementation of the joint work plan, have used the following ways and means to carry out the proposed actions in the third joint work plan:

(a) Ensuring consultation and exchange of information by Chairs of the subsidiary bodies of the two Conventions in planning their programmes of work, and the participation of Chairs in the subsidiary bodies of the other Convention;

(b) Establishing regular consultation and cooperation between the two Secretariats and their joint development of initiatives and projects;

(c) Ensuring participation of representatives of Secretariats and subsidiary bodies in expert meetings and working groups;

(d) Accessing each Convention's roster of experts, and the expert networks of Ramsar's international organization partners (BirdLife International, World Conservation Union (IUCN), World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) and Wetlands International) and other scientific and technical organizations with which the Conventions cooperate for sourcing expertise to contribute to the implementation of the joint work plan;

(e) Ensuring that reports and other materials prepared by subsidiary bodies are made available to their meetings and to the work of expert liaison and working groups;

(f) Promoting dissemination of information and case-studies to Contracting Parties and others through the Clearing-House Mechanism (CHM) of the Convention on Biological Diversity and Ramsar's Website; and

(g) Encouraging communication and collaboration at the national level between the national focal points for the Convention on Biological Diversity and Ramsar administrative authorities and, where appropriate, with counterparts for other multilateral environmental agreements.

14. As part of the enhanced cooperation under this joint work plan the two secretariats have jointly undertaken a number of major activities as listed in section IV.

15. Responsibility for implementing most actions of the third joint work plan lies with the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Secretariat of the Ramsar Convention, the Convention's scientific and technical subsidiary bodies and Parties to the Conventions. In addition, other multilateral environmental agreements (MEAs) and international organizations, such as Wetlands International, IUCN-The World Conservation Union and the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations have been invited to contribute to the implementation of the joint work plan.

III. TIMEFRAMES, REVIEW AND REPORTING

16. The provisional schedule of meetings of the Conference of Parties and subsidiary bodies of the Convention on Biological Diversity and Ramsar Convention during the period of this third joint work plan is as follows:

17. The Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Secretariat of the Ramsar Convention undertake an annual review of the joint work plan and introduce amendments, as necessary, so as to fully address joint activity arising from the decisions of the sixth and seventh meetings of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity and the eighth and ninth meetings of the Parties to the Ramsar Convention, as well as relevant recommendations of their respective scientific bodies.

18. The first review was made in December 2002 and took into account the changes to the *modus operandi* of the Ramsar STRP which were approved at the eighth meeting of the Parties to the Ramsar Convention. The review also addressed issues arising from the decisions on International Environmental Governance and other matters of direct interest to the Conventions by the World Summit on Sustainable Development in August/September 2002. The second review took place subsequent to the ninth SBSTTA (17 November, 2003) and included consideration of the proposed revised programme of work of the Convention on Biological Diversity on the biological diversity of inland water ecosystems (SBSTTA recommendation VIII/2).

19. The joint work plan will be reviewed subsequent to the seventh meeting of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity at which the revised programme of work for the Convention on Biological Diversity on the biological diversity of inland water ecosystems will be considered together with outcome-oriented targets for the programme of work on the biological diversity of inland water ecosystems (UNEP/CBD/COP/7/20/Add.4).

20. A final report on the third joint work plan and a draft fourth joint work plan will be submitted to the eighth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Ramsar Standing Committee in 2006.
